What is IP?



Intellectual Property = good ideas, e.g. inventions, designs, brands, art, music, software

- Allows creators to protect their ideas and profit from them
- Work in IP = Protect ideas from unwanted copying

Protected in law by patents, designs, copyright, trademarks, etc.







IP protection benefits everyone



- Ideas are £ in today's economy IP enables owning & profiting from them
- Protects & encourages world-changing innovation from your phone to your clothes, IP shapes the world around us!
- Disclosure of **patents** adds to public knowledge, fostering further innovation and solving problems, making everyone's life better



- 2021 onwards: Joined GSK as a UK and European qualified patent attorney






Role summary

- Understand technology and advise on the law
- Meet with inventors to capture inventions
- Prepare patent applications
- Respond to communications from the Patent Office (UK and Europe directly)
- Third party patents licence vs oppose
- Advise on IP aspects of contracts
- Advise on commercial and strategic issues
- And a lot more...!





Positives and negatives of the job

Pros:

- Interesting
- Intellectually challenging
- Variety of work
- Forefront of technology
- Professional qualification
- Earning potential

Cons:

- Legal language can be challenging
- Minimum 4 years training
- Exams
- Deadline driven





Tips and advice

- Polish and tailor CV and cover letter
- Focus on key skills organization, ability to learn new areas quickly, balancing multiple deadlines, resilience/dealing with failure
- Stand out from the crowd all experience counts!
- Network offline and online









Alex Nott

Trade Mark Associate, Dehns

- Graduated in June 2016 with a BA in Politics and International Relations, and started working at Dehns as a Trade Mark Assistant in September 2016.
- Did two short work experience placements during university summers (both in commercial law firms, but with some involvement in IP).
- Passed QMUL PG Cert in TM Law and Practice in 2018 (part-qualified).
- Passed NTU TM Practice Certificate in 2019 (fully qualified).
- Associate of Dehns in 2022.





Role summary

- Advising clients on, and assisting with, the protection and enforcement of their trade marks. These can include business names, product names, logos and slogans, as well as more unusual signs such as shapes and colour combinations. Protection involves clearance searching/availability advice and then prosecution/registration, and enforcement involves opposition proceedings, cease and desist letters, etc.
- It's a very commercial area of IP commercial agreements relating to trade marks are very common (coexistence, assignments, licencing).
- Also advise on related issues such as designs, copyright and domain name/company name disputes.



Role requirements

- Most employers will likely be looking for candidates to achieve a 2.1 undergraduate degree. However, unlike the patent attorney job role, there are no specific subject requirements to be a Trade Mark Attorney (language skills are advantageous but not essential luckily for me!).
- Any experience to show an interest in IP/law would help (e.g. a work experience or placement scheme), but again is not essential.
- <u>Key skills:</u> attention to detail, strong written and oral communication, research ability – think about examples from your degree or any parttime work that showcase these.



Positives and negatives of the job

Pros:

- Diverse client base. Every business, in every commercial field, has a trade mark – this means working with companies of all sizes, and learning about industries you might not have come across before. This keeps the job fresh and interesting.
- Community. The TMA profession is small, and so you get to know colleagues in the UK and overseas quite well.

Cons:

- Time-pressure. Timescales for trade mark matters tend to be shorter than for patents (weeks/1-2 months, rather than 6 months+).
- Billing! (Although this is less relevant at the training stage, and is a feature of most legal jobs.)



Tips and advice

- Be prepared to do your own research there seems to be quite limited awareness of the Trade Mark Attorney job role and career path amongst Careers Services, so you might have to put in more time to find out about the opportunities that are available.
- Research different firms so you can make an informed decision about where you would like to work.
- Engage with news stories about IP certain disputes get picked up by mainstream media and being able to talk about and have an opinion on these is really valuable in an interview.
- Check your CV and Cover Letter over and over again!











 - School leavers / Graduates different routes (explained later)






Role requirements



- Experience
 - Work experience (helps but not mandatory)
- Skills
 - Attention to detail
 - Communication skills
 - Team Work
 - Analytical skills
 - Organisational Skills





Positives and negatives of the job



Pros:

- Interesting, varied work and clients
- Rewarding, contribute to society, learning all the time
- Pay?
- Trendy?



Cons:

- Long hours
- Stress



Tips and advice



- How to Enter
 - School leavers Apprenticeship (6 years) +
 SQE ("super exam")
 - **Graduates** (any degree): SQE + 2 years' qualifying work experience/training contract
 - Application deadlines 2 years ahead for training contracts

- Love it
- Research
 - Law firm specific arrangements / Vacation
 Schemes

Role requirements:

- Law degree/GDL + non-law degree.
- Bar Practice Course.
- 12 months of pupillage.

Tips to enter the profession:

- Advocacy experience.
- Mini pupillages.
- Speak to as many people as possible.





Positives and negatives of the job

Pros:

- Self-employment: freedom.
- Variation.
- Satisfying.

Cons:

- Self-employment: uncertainty.
- Stress.
- Sometimes very long hours.



Recruitment process



- Trainee Attorney roles (private practice):
 - Yearly recruitment cycles
 - CV + Cover letter
 - Typically a two-stage interview process: technical and non-technical questions
- Paralegal/administrator roles:
 - Apply direct or through recruitment agencies





Recruitment process



- Examiner roles:
 - Apply through Civil Service Jobs website
 - Interview questions and interactive tasks
- Solicitor roles:
 - Vacation Schemes
 - Training Contract
